## **Mulloway madness**

Over the past month rumours were heard of possible changes to recreational and commercial mulloway catch and size limits. Puzzled grumbles quickly turned into an uproar when the inequity of the changes became known.

Mulloway, or jewfish, are one of our most prized sport and table fish. They are a challenging and magnificent fish for shore based anglers to fish for, with success often coming only after many, many hours fishing in trying conditions.

It seems that DPI had ideas for a recreational bag limit of just 1 fish over 75 cm in NSW waters while commercial fishers would be allowed to net up to 50 juvenile fish, i.e. those between 45 cm and 75 cm.

We hear this was not a plan cooked up by desk-bound bureaucrats...it was developed after consultation with commercial and recreational interests and environmentalists...and was headed for the office of Fisheries Minister Katrina Hodgkinson. The group that was consulted reportedly includes the Mulloway Resource Planning Group (members unknown), the Advisory Council on Recreational Fishing, the (former) Ocean Trap and Line Management Advisory Committee, the Professional Fishermen's Association and EcoFishers.

After a storm of protest from anglers and the fishing media NSW DPI denied that such a drastic proposal was on the cards and now says that there will be public consultation before it goes much further.

There is widespread support among recreational anglers for an increase in size limits (currently 45 cm) to allow fish to get to breeding size (which starts at about 70 cm, with all females thought to be mature by 80 cm) before they are caught by anglers or commercial fishers, and there also seems to be strong support for reduced bag limits (down from the current limit of five mulloway per day). The *Fishing World* website ran a survey that showed that around 90 per cent of respondents do not agree with commercial netting of juvenile mulloway.

Increasing the size limit to allow the fish to breed before they are extracted is considered by many anglers and scientists as being vital if stocks are to remain viable.

Stan Konstantaras, from ANSA NSW and RFA of NSW says "Recreational anglers are responsible custodians of the resource, and if we have good, current and solid science that says we need to make some changes in our practices at a recreational fishing level to rebuild the stocks then we will accept this.

"We also want to see meaningful reductions in the commercial harvest of mulloway and a notake on undersized fish and some changes to the estuary prawn trawl practices that impact on juvenile mulloway. ANSA NSW would like an opportunity to provide our members' input in a truly transparent process."


